GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLE: Equine Association of Yukon (EAY), supports adherence to humane treatment of horses in all competitions under its jurisdiction. The EC is committed to upholding the welfare of horses, regardless of value as a primary consideration in all activities, requiring that horses be treated with kindness, respect and the compassion that they deserve, and that they never be subjected to mistreatment; ensuring that owners, trainers, exhibitors, and their agents use responsible care in the handling, treatment, and transportation of their horses as well as horses placed in their care for any purpose; providing for the continuous well-being of horses by encouraging routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals and competition officials to achieve the highest possible standards of nutrition, health, comfort, sanitation and safety as a manner of standard operating procedure; continuing to support scientific studies on equine health and welfare, requiring owners, trainers and exhibitors to know and follow their sanctioning organizations' rules and to work within industry regulations in all equestrian competitions, reviewing, revising and developing competition rules and regulations that protect the welfare of horses. The standard by which conduct or treatment will be measured is that which a reasonable person, informed and experienced in generally accepted equine training and exhibition procedures, would determine to be neither cruel, abusive nor inhumane.
- 2. Every class offered herein is covered by the rules and specifications of the current rules of EAY and will be held and judged in accordance with the EAY rules. Knowledge of the rules is the responsibility of the competitor.
- 3. Competitor Identification numbers must be worn and visible at all times while on the competition grounds.
- 4. Riders must include payment, copy of current coggins test, signed waiver, and proof (photocopy) of current EAY membership for entries to be accepted.
- 5. All riders regardless of age or level of competition must wear ASTM/SEI or BSI/BS EN approved protective headgear at all times when mounted at the competition site.
- 6. Entry fees will be refunded on presentation of a veterinarian's or physician's certificate.
- 7. Lunging may only be done by the athlete, owner, coach, groom or Person Responsible.
- 8. The Show Office will be open on Friday, August 26th, 2022 between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. for pick- up of competitors show package and horse stabling information. The Show Office will also open each morning 30 minutes before the start of the show.

- 9. Limited overnight stabling available in outdoor stalls and small pens starting on Friday night.
- 10. All competitors hauling to the show must check in at show office before unloading horses. Current boarders of the facility must check in at the show office. Competitors will receive rider number and stabling information (if required) at that time.
- 11. The indoor arena is designated as the warm-up area and may be used at any time. Warm-up in any other location is not permitted.
- 12. Open and Adult Amateurs (AA) will compete in the same class unless sufficient entries allow for division of the class.
- 13. Emergency Disaster plan (muster point) will be posted at show office, in the arena stabling area, at ring bulletin board. Klondike Safety Services is the lead during all on site emergencies with the exception of horse only injuries.
- 14. **Scratches:** Please notify the Show Office if you choose not to participate in a class you have entered (scratch). This avoids confusion for Show administrators.
- 15. **Class Changes:** Show Officials may cancel or combine classes if there are less than 3 entries. Classes with more than 8 entries may be divided by age.

16. Stalls and Pens:

- a. Indoor stalls: Competitors whose horses are boarded full time at the Riding Arena may use the indoor stalls for tacking and un-tacking only. All other competitors may tack and untack at their pen, outdoor stall, or at their trailer.
- b. Pens: Seven covered pens are available at a fee of \$35 per night; open pens are \$20 per night. Please indicate on your entry form whether you prefer a covered or open pen. Covered pens will be provided on a first come, first served basis. If covered pens are not available, an open pen will be assigned and the overpayment will be refunded. Open pens are made of portable panels. Please bring rain sheets as wind is too strong for rigged shelters. NO TARPS OVER PENS PLEASE
- c. Clean up Deposit: A \$40 clean up deposit must accompany entry please provide a separate cheque. If you choose not to clean your pen, the deposit will not be refunded. Drop by the Show Office to be refunded the clean up fee when you leave.
- 17. Trailer Parking: Please check in at the Show Office before parking and setting up, as you may be asked to move. PLEASE CHECK IN UPON ARRIVAL AND BEFORE UNLOADING HORSES. You will be given your show package and proof of negative Coggins may be checked.
- 18. Competitors under the age of 13 must have adult supervision at all times.
- 19. **Please leave your dogs at home.** This is to ensure the safety of competitors, horses and audience members.
- 20. Loose horses are not allowed on the grounds at any time. Horses must be ridden or lead at the walk at all times while not inside the arenas.

CLASS & DIVISION DESCRIPTIONS

LEAD LINE: This class does not require competitors to be members of the Equine Assn. of Yukon. This class is an opportunity for all the aspiring young riders to be able to show off their newly developed riding skills.

STAKE RACE: Stake Race is a timed event similar to Pole Bending, except that only two stakes are used, and are run in a figure eight pattern, with start and finish at the end of the pattern. A three second penalty will be assessed and added to the exhibitor's total time for each stake knocked over. Horses that cross either the start or finish line during the run will be disqualified. Fastest time wins.

POLE BENDING: Pole Bending is a timed event using 6 poles. Each pole is 21ft (6.4m) apart and the first pole is 21ft from the starting line. Poles are 6ft in height. Horses will begin down either side of the line of poles to the end, weave in and out through the poles and return to the start-finish line. A knockdown of a pole will carry a 5 second penalty; failure to follow the course will result in disqualification. The exhibitor's hat or helmet must be worn the entire time. Fastest time wins.

KEYHOLE: A keyhole will be drawn with flour on the arena surface. Riders will go straight into the keyhole, turn, and return to the start/finish line. Stepping on or over the keyhole line is a disqualification. The rider with the fastest time wins.

BARREL RACING: Barrel racing is a timed event using three barrels. Horses shall race in a cloverleaf pattern around the barrels, individually timed and the fastest time wins. Knocking over a barrel carries a 5 second time penalty. Failure to follow the course shall cause disqualification. The exhibitor's hat or helmet must be worn the entire time.

PEEWEE: Maximum age for a peewee is 11 years of age or younger as of January 1st of the calendar year. Riders may be asked to canter/lope.

JUNIOR: Maximum age for a junior is 17 years of age or younger as of January 1^{st} of the calendar year.

WALK/TROT: Walk/Trot and Walk/Jog classes may be entered by Junior or Open riders.

HALTER: Horses are shown in-hand with a serviceable halter or bridle at the walk and trot. Emphasis shall be placed on type, conformation, substance and quality.

SHOWMANSHIP: Judged strictly on the exhibitor's ability to fit and show a horse at halter. The ideal performance consists of a poised, confident, neatly attired exhibitor leading a well groomed and conditioned horse that quickly and efficiently performs the requested pattern with promptness, smoothness and precision. Exhibitor's will demonstrate prescribed pattern, and will be judged on appearance and performance.

IN-HAND TRAIL: Judged on the performance of the horse over and through obstacles, with emphasis on manners, response to handler and attitude.

TRAIL: A well mannered, sensible trail horse must display the intelligence and ability to carry its rider safely over and through the various obstacles on the course. Horses are judged on the

performance of the horse over obstacles, with emphasis on manners, response of rider and quality of movement. Obstacles may include gates, poles, a bridge, carrying objects, a back through and side pass.

HUNTER OVER FENCES: To be judged on manners, way of going and style of jumping over a course of obstacles. Manners shall be emphasized in Youth/Junior classes. Horses must enter and exit ring at a walk. All horses must be serviceably sound. Any horse showing lameness, broken wind or impairment of vision may be penalized severely or eliminated at judge's discretion. The course shall consist of a minimum of six jumps, with a minimum of one change of direction required.

HANDY HUNTER: Judged on manners, quality of movement, and response to rider. Course shall vary from the normal hunter class routine to include elements that show ride-ability and handiness. Obstacles may include small jumps, poles, back through, bridge, gate, and side pass. To be ridden in English tack.

SHORT STIRRUP: Peewee and Junior riders who are new to jumping.

LONG STIRRUP: Riders over the age of 18 who are new to jumping.

WESTERN PLEASURE: A good pleasure horse has a free flowing stride, should cover ground with little effort and gaits of the proper cadence. To be shown on a reasonably loose rein, with light contact and control. Maximum credit will be given to the flowing, balanced and willing horse which gives the appearance of being fit and a pleasure to ride. To be judged on performance, manners, conformation, quality and substance. Horses to be shown at a walk, jog and lope on a reasonably loose rein or light contact with undue restraint.

WESTERN EQUITATION: Riders will be judged on seat, hands, performance of horse, appointments of horse and rider, and suitability of horse to rider. Riders enter the ring at a walk or jog and are judged at a flat-footed four-beat walk, two-beat jog and a three-beat lope both ways of the ring. Judges will call for at least two tests which will include back, lope and stop, individual performance on the rail, figure eight at the jog, simple change of lead, flying change of lead, sliding stop, 360 degree turns (spins) and roll backs.

RANCH RIDING: The purpose of Ranch Riding is to show a working horse's versatility, attitude, and movement. In this class, the primary considerations are the horse's quality of movement and overall manners and responsiveness while performing the required maneuvers.

WESTERN COMMAND CLASS: This is an elimination class. Elimination is a result of the horse/rider not completing the commands in a timely manner. Riders will be called to the centre of the arena as they are eliminated. Commands will suit the level of the class.

REINING: To rein a horse is not only to guide it, but also to control its every movement. The best reined horse should be willingly guided or controlled with little or no apparent resistance and dictated to completely. Any movement on its own must be considered a lack of control. All deviations from the exact written pattern must be considered a lack of or temporary loss of control, and therefore faulted according to severity of deviation. Credit will be given for smoothness, finesse, attitude, quickness and authority in performing the various maneuvers while using controlled speed.

HUNTER UNDER SADDLE: This class will be judged on performance, condition and conformation. Credit will be given to the flowing, balanced, willing horse with ground covering and relaxed strides of good quality. To be shown at a walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring, to back easily and stand quietly.


HUNT SEAT EQUITATION: Hunt Seat Equitation includes two separate classes; on the flat, and over fences. Entries are judged on the rider's ability. In the flat class, riders will be asked to walk, trot and canter at least one direction of the ring, and may be asked to perform an individual pattern. Sitting trot and hand gallop may be asked for. Over fence classes will include a series of hunter fences. For both classes, exhibitors shall be judged on hands, seat, legs; basic position and on their ability to ride and control the horse correctly in a hunt or forward seat. Neatness and presentation are all taken into judge's final consideration.

ENGLISH PLEASURE: To be shown at the flat footed walk, normal trot and easy canter, light contact to be maintained. To be judged on manners, performance, quality and conformation. Tack and personal appointments appropriate to seat being ridden. Judged on: (45%) performance (40%) manners (15%) conformation

JUMPER: A jumper class is a timed event where horse and rider are tested over a designated course of a minimum of eight to ten obstacles. Horse and rider are judged on performance only with time and faults determining placing. Course should be designed to demonstrate the athletic ability and obedience of the horse and skill of the rider. Jumps are typically more airy than hunter fences. Horses with no faults in first round may be asked to proceed to jump off course. Safety is of utmost importance; all equipment should be in good working order.

POWER & SPEED: If rider completes course clear, he/she then completes an immediate jump off; fastest jump off wins.


REINING PATTERN 1



- Run at speed to the far end of the arena past the end marker and do a left rollback – no hesitation.
- Run to the opposite end of the arena past the end marker and do a right rollback – no hesitation.
- 3. Run past the center marker and do a sliding stop. Back up to center of the arena or at least ten feet. Hesitate.
- 4. Complete four spins to the right. Hesitate.
- Complete four and one-quarter spins to the left so that horse is facing left wall or fence. Hesitate.
- Beginning on the left lead, complete three circles to the left: the first circle large and fast; the second circle small and slow; the third circle large and fast. Change leads at the center of the arena.
- Complete three circles to the right: the first circle large and fast; the second circle small and slow; the third circle large and fast. Change leads at the center of the arena.
- Begin a large fast circle to the left but do not close this circle. Run straight up the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a sliding stop at least twenty feet from wall or fence. Hesitate to demonstrate the completion of the pattern.

Rider must dismount and drop bridle to the designated judge.


REINING PATTERN 2



Horses may walk or trot to the center of the arena. Horses must walk or stop prior to starting the pattern. Beginning at the center of the arena facing the left wall or fence.

- Complete two spins to the left. Hesitate.
- Complete two spins to the right. Hesitate
- Trot once circle to the right, change directions at the center of the arena.
- Complete one circle to the left, change directions at the center of the arena.
- Begin a circle to the right but do not close this circle. Trot straigh down the right side of the arena past the center marker, stop and back up at least IO feet. Hesitate to demonstrate completion of the pattern.

REINING PATTERN 3



Horses may walk or trot to the center of the arena. Horses must walk or stop prior to starting the pattern. Beginning at the center of the arena facing the left wall or fence.

 Beginning on the left lead, complete two circles to the left. Stop at the center of the arena. Hesitate.

 Complete two spins to the left. Hesitate
 Beginning on the right lead complete two circles to the right. Stop at the center of the arena. Hesitate.

 Beginning on the left lead, go around the end of the arena, run down the right side of the arena past center marker, stop and roll back right. Continue around the end of the arena to run down the left side of the arena.

Hesitate to show completion of pattern.
